

Mandates and special privileges for COVID-19 vaccination

With COVID-19 vaccination underway or on the horizon in many countries, many are turning their attention to whether COVID-19 vaccination should be made mandatory, and if so, under what conditions, for whom, and in what contexts. This webinar will explore the ethics of mandatory COVID-19 vaccination both in general and in particular settings (e.g., health care settings), as well as examine the ethics of affording special privileges to those who are vaccinated, e.g., to travel and to gather in large groups.
