The poster is titled "Involving research communities in drafting new Guidelines for Research Ethics in SSI". The text discusses the first San Code of Ethics developed by indigenous African people, emphasizing the importance of involving research communities in the process. It highlights the need for transparency, respect, care, and justice in research.

Key Elements of the San Code of Ethics:

- Honesty: The code requires honesty from all those who come to the San with research proposals.
- Respect: The San people assert that they require "respect not only for individuals but also for the community."
- Care: This section is rooted in relationship. It is a measure which the researcher and the San community will employ through the research relationship.
- Justice and honesty: Justice and honesty in research require that the San are meaningfully involved in the proposed study, which includes learning about the benefits that the participants and the community might expect.

Methods and materials:

- We conducted a qualitative study based on in-depth interviews with 12 biomedical researchers, five females and seven males aged 34 to 74 years, currently working at an African university.
- Interviews lasted 35–40 min each and involved semi-structured open-ended interviews, which allowed participants to offer information about their perceptions and feelings regarding the San code of ethics.
- Empirical data from the interviews were recorded, transcribed, and analysed using thematic content analysis, together with an interrogation of relevant guidelines (CIMRS and Declaration of Helsinki) and academic literature about African communitarian ethics, making evaluations and drawing inferences consistent with the empirical bioethics approach.

Involving research communities in drafting
new Guidelines for Research Ethics in SSI

The National Committee for Research Ethics in the Social Sciences and the Humanities is an independent advisory body responsible for developing guidelines for research ethics. The first edition of NESH's guidelines was published in 1993, and revised editions were published in 2006 and 2016.

A revised draft was circulated for public consultation in the autumn of 2019. The purpose is to highlight the guidelines as an independent tool for researchers to ensure that research increasingly is under pressure, and different actors are involved in ensuring compliance with research ethics. Furthermore, the distinction between research ethics and data protection law is underscored to the benefit of both.

The publication consists of five parts (A–E):

A) The research community: Researchers have a responsibility to involve each other's contributions in a collective way, through supervision, dissemination, teaching, and research.

B) Research partners: Researchers have a responsibility to take into account the needs of the community, and to be selected by the community.

C) Guidelines for research ethics in the social sciences and the humanities.
