New Mpox resource on Global Outbreaks Research knowledge hub

The World Health Organization and Africa CDC have each declared the ongoing mpox outbreak a Public Health Emergency.

The Global Health Network is working closely with researchers in the Democratic Republic of the Congo to understand transmission, severity of disease, longevity and to minimise the spread. However, more research is needed into this new strain.

There is a need for vaccine and treatment assessments, alongside better detection through community use diagnostics. It is also vital to understand community perception and behaviours so that effective public health campaigns can be designed to increase access to care and to slow transmission.

1000 Challenge: Research, Leadership, Impact

The 1000 Challenge is an initiative enabling individuals to set up pragmatic and achievable studies designed to solve challenging healthcare issues. The study could be observational, social science (behavioral or practice), diagnostic, or clinical trials involving existing drugs, vaccines or non-pharmaceutical interventions. The research study could address a locally important question to improve patient management care or treatment, to drive changes in practice and management.

The Global Health Network supports research at every step from design, planning, and implementation through to the uptake of findings, so that nurses and community health workers can address whatever challenges they recognise as a priority amongst their patients.

The Global Health Network Nigeria Meetings and Research Visit to Gombe State and Obafemi Awolowo University in Nigeria

Representatives from The Global Health Network conducted a research visit to Gombe State and Obafemi Awolowo University in Nigeria. The Global Health Network Nigeria visit

aimed to foster future collaborations, strengthening the research capacity in Nigeria.

In Gombe, activities focused on discussions with health officials and involved training at the Snake Bite Treatment and Research Hospital (SBRTH). This was invaluable for improving research and data science skills, building transferrable knowledge on implementing electronic health records, advancing laboratory-based research and expanding access to anti-snake venom.

In Ife, strategic meetings with university leaders focused on advancing research capacity and collaboration to improve health outcomes in the sub-Saharan region, by addressing research gaps, identifying partnerships and exploring future funding opportunities.
