Research Ethics Online Training on the Global Health Training Centre Updated

The updated course offers an innovative approach to understanding and navigating the complexities of ethical research practices. Combining updated case studies in real-world scenarios, the course provides participants with comprehensive insights into key ethical considerations in international health research.

The Research Ethics Online Training is adapted from an e-learning course and resource package designed and produced by the World Health Organization (WHO) for use by internal staff. Research is a vital ingredient for improved global health, and scientifically sound and ethically appropriate research is especially important in resource-poor settings where the need for locally applicable research findings is so great. Therefore, the WHO has very kindly granted permission for the adaptation of this resource in a format and platform that is accessible to all. Take the course:

LactaHub Breastfeeding Workshop: Empowering Primary Healthcare Workers for Better Child and Maternal Health

The Lactahub Breastfeeding Workshop took place at the Amref International University 1st Primary Healthcare Congress 2023, Kenya in partnership with the Kenya Association for Breastfeeding and LactaHub. The workshop aimed to train primary healthcare workers in East Africa on breastmilk benefits, lactation management and breastfeeding support. By sharing practical and evidence-based knowledge, participants learned how to protect, promote, and support breastfeeding, improving the health, nutrition, and well-being of infants, children, and mothers in the region.

This makes the diploma the first of its kind where all the core skills and component steps identified to undertake quality, practical and appropriate health research studies are covered, making it relevant for research into any disease, in all types of studies, and in any setting.
