Watch the recording: WHO launches new clinical trials guidance - What do I need to know?



In September 2024, WHO published its ground-breaking guidance on best practices for clinical trials, establishing a global framework for the design and conduct of clinical trials.

This session features opening remarks from WHO's Chief Scientist, Dr Jeremy Farrar and Professor John Reeder, Director of the Special Programme for Research and Training in Tropical Diseases (TDR). This is followed by a detailed overview from WHO's Research for Health Senior Advisor, Dr Vasee Moorthy. The event explored how the guidance simplifies the clinical trial approval processes and promotes a risk-based, proportionate approach to trial design and data oversight.

This event was organised in collaboration with The Global Health Network, a WHO Collaborating Centre for research information sharing and capacity development.

The launch event, which took place at the Canadian University Dubai on 21 October 2024, marked an important milestone towards enhancing health research, systems strengthening, public health education, and practice across the MENA region.

Through capacity strengthening initiatives, knowledge exchange and collaborative partnerships, The Global Health Network MENA brings health research ability and activities to every healthcare setting, creating positive outcomes across the region.

The course is based on the evidence-led Essential Research Skills Training Curriculum for Health Research which was developed as a collaboration between The Global Health Network, UNICEF, the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), the World Bank and WHO Special Programme for Research and Training in Tropical Diseases. The programme is based on a study that involved over 7,000 participants from 153 countries. This makes the diploma the first of its kind where all the core skills and component steps identified to undertake quality, practical and appropriate health research studies are covered, making it relevant for research into any disease, in all types of studies, and in any setting.

This part time course is suitable for busy professionals who want to keep working or cannot travel, and aims to tackle inequities in health research leadership. Learn more:

New publication on data science capacity building initiatives to tackle public health challenges in low and middle-income countries

The Global Health Network are excited to share the publication of 'Current Data Science Capacity Building Initiatives for Health Researchers in LMICs: Global and Regional Efforts' in Frontiers in Public Health. This collaborative effort by Health Data Research UK, icddr,b, Fiocruz, and The Global Health Network Africa highlights the transformative role of data science in tackling public health challenges in low- and middle-income countries (LMICs), enabling you to discover insights into collaborative efforts to strengthen health research capacity.

The review maps diverse capacity-building initiatives across LMICs, many operating through collaborative hubs and consortia. Whilst fostering multidisciplinary networks, the

study also identifies gaps such as the lack of cohesive frameworks and standardised impact metrics. As a central resource, The Global Health Network provides tools and platforms that enable health researchers to connect, learn, and scale data science capacity.

These events aim to update clinical trial specialists and research leaders on the latest guidelines by GCTC and the World Health Organization.

Introduction to Good Clinical Trials - Latin America and the Caribbean (LAC)

The two-year period between 2022-2024 has seen ground-breaking changes, making public, community and patient engagement key and essential components of health research. These changes are highlighted in the publication of three important documents:

- The World Health Assembly (WHA) Resolution 75.8 May 2022
- The WHO Guidance for best practices for clinical trials September 2024
- Declaration of Helsinki (WMA) October 2024

By integrating these guidelines into their work, health professionals can conduct more effective, ethical, and inclusive research, ultimately leading to improved health outcomes and stronger community relationships.
