Malaria Burden in Southeast Asia: Research Findings and Community Engagement Impact

Researchers will discuss the regional malaria research portfolio in southeast Asia. This includes their historic role in developing artemether-based drugs, surveillance of drugresistant malaria, treatment trials, and the importance of trials in pregnant women, and more.

The webinar also highlights innovative community engagement initiatives. Including bringing community voices, engaging with hard-to-reach communities in challenging contexts, and using creative approaches to build awareness and understanding.

Organised by The Global Health Network, the Oxford University Clinical Research Unit (OUCRU) and the Mahidol Oxford Tropical Medicine Research Unit (MORU), it aims to provide deep insight into malaria, an often-overlooked burden in Southeast Asia.

Universal Newborn Screening in Low and Middle-Income Countries

Date / Time: Thursday 24 April 2025 at 13:00 UTC+1

The World Health Assembly Resolution 77.5 (Accelerating progress towards reducing maternal, newborn and child mortality in order to achieve Sustainable Development Goal targets 3.1 and 3.2) invites member states to consider the implementation of a universal newborn screening programme, which includes comprehensive birth defects screening with consideration of the specific needs for the diagnosis, management and long-term care of children with birth defects (WHA77.5; June 1 2024).

Situating screening for structural congenital anomalies within the broader context of universal newborn screening represents a change in approach. The World Health Organization is currently chairing a consultation process on newborn screening.

The panel will consider the implementation of this approach in low and middle-income countries with reference to specific screening practices.

Strengthening Health Systems Through Responsible AI: A New Discussion Paper

A new IDRC discussion paper, *Strengthening Health Systems Through Responsible AI: An Emergent Research Landscape*, explores how AI can address global health challenges and reduce inequities.

Featuring 12 case studies, it highlights Al's role in tackling issues like women's health, water supply, air quality, disease outbreaks, and misinformation.

The paper identifies critical gaps in evidence and outlines opportunities for responsible Al use, focusing on:

- Regulation, policy, and governance
- Data quality and representation

- Gender equality, ethics, and sustainability
- · Global South-led partnerships

It also suggests key areas for exploration, such as strengthening the health workforce and advancing community based one health surveillance and solutions.

This paper offers a roadmap to guide discussions and action among the global research community.

Between September and December 2024, nursing professionals from Colombia and Honduras participated in a free diploma program, 'Systematizing Experiences in Health Institutions,' led by the Universidad del Valle under The Global Health Network Latin America and the Caribbean.

The diploma focuses on the systematization of experiences, which is a participatory methodology that transforms real-world healthcare practices into actionable knowledge. By empowering nurses to document, analyze and share insights from their work, the program aims to improve healthcare delivery and foster evidence-based innovation.

This initiative contributes to The Global Health Network Latin America and the Caribbean's mission to strengthen health research in the region through knowledge exchange and training, while advancing its vision of ensuring equitable access to better health practices
