Malaria Burden in Southeast Asia: Research Findings and Community Engagement Impact



Date / Time: Wednesday 23 April 2025 at 12:00 UTC+1

Researchers will discuss the regional malaria research portfolio in southeast Asia. This includes their historic role in developing artemether-based drugs, surveillance of drugresistant malaria, treatment trials, the importance of trials in pregnant women, and more.

The webinar also highlights innovative community engagement initiatives, including bringing community voices to the fore, engaging with hard-to-reach communities in challenging contexts, and using creative approaches to build awareness and understanding.

Organised by The Global Health Network, the Oxford University Clinical Research Unit (OUCRU) and the Mahidol Oxford Tropical Medicine Research Unit (MORU), the webinar aims to provide deep insight into malaria, an often-overlooked burden in Southeast Asia.

Universal Newborn Screening in Low and Middle-Income Countries

Date / Time: Thursday 24 April 2025 at 14:00 UTC+1

The World Health Assembly Resolution 77.5 (Accelerating progress towards reducing maternal, newborn and child mortality in order to achieve Sustainable Development Goal targets 3.1 and 3.2) invites member states to consider the implementation of a universal newborn screening programme, which includes comprehensive birth defects screening with consideration of the specific needs for the diagnosis, management and long-term care of children with birth defects (WHA77.5; June 1 2024).

Situating screening for structural congenital anomalies within the broader context of universal newborn screening represents a change in approach. The World Health Organization is currently chairing a consultation process on newborn screening.

The panel will consider the implementation of this approach in low and middle-income countries with reference to specific screening practices.

Strengthening Good Clinical Trials Practice in Latin America: Workshop on Implementing New WHO Guidelines

On 18 March 2025 The Global Health Network and the Good Clinical Trials Collaborative (GCTC) conducted an in-person workshop focused on the practical implementation of the new WHO Guidance for best practices for clinical trials.

The workshop, titled 'Strengthening Good Clinical Practices in Latin America' took place at the Institute for Clinical Effectiveness and Health Policy (IECS) in Buenos Aires, Argentina. It brought together 21 participants, including researchers, ethics committee members, and representatives from the Argentine regulatory agency.

Workshop themes included adaptive clinical trial designs, data governance, ethical regulations, and the main challenges of implementing the new recommendations in local contexts.

By convening this workshop, The Global Health Network is committed to strengthening health research and innovation capacities in Latin America and the Caribbean.

Connected for Change: The Global Health Network Highlights from the Africa Health Agenda International Conference (AHAIC) 2025

From 2 – 5 March 2025, The Global Health Network participated in the Africa Health Agenda International Conference (AHAIC) in Kigali, Rwanda, joining policymakers, researchers, and health leaders to redefine the future of health in Africa and challenge inequities.

The Global Health Network was represented by Dr Elizabeth Allen, Course Director for the University of Oxford's Postgraduate Diploma in Global Health Research, and Gloria Rukomeza, Coordinator of The Global Health Network Rwanda.

The Africa Oxford Initiative (AfOx) funded participation for sixteen AfOx scholars including current students and alumni of the diploma programme to enhance their learning and professional development.

Through initiatives like these, The Global Health Network continues its mission to advance equitable health research across Africa, ensuring that every healthcare setting can generate, access and apply life-saving evidence.

Mesh and Partners are Developing a New Engagement and Involvement Course for Clinical Trials to Align with WHO Guidance

Community engagement and involvement experts from Kenya, Tanzania, Malawi, and South Africa were hosted by Amref International University on the 26th and 27th of March 2025 in a working meeting aimed at developing an online training course on public, community, and patient engagement and involvement in clinical trials.

Similar working meetings are planned for Nepal and the Dominican Republic at the end of April and May, respectively, to gather further regional knowledge and expertise. The course is aimed at strengthening public, community and patient engagement and involvement with clinical trials, aligning with the WHO's Guidance on Best Practices for Clinical Trials (2024).

Brain Infections Global Develop Intervention to Improve Diagnosis and Management of Acute Brain Infections

Brain Infections Global have successfully developed and implemented an intervention that improved the diagnosis and management of brain infections such as meningitis in hospitals across Brazil, India and Malawi.

In a study published in *The Lancet Global Health*, the group shared results of an intervention package to improve diagnosis and early management of hospitalised patients with suspected acute brain infections.

The Lancet Global Health, featured an editorial on this study and said: "This is the first study to report the positive effect of an intervention package for a central nervous system infection that is generalisable across [low and middle-income countries]."

The Global Health Network is proud to partner with Brain Infections Global, an NIHR Global Health Research Group on Improving the Management of Acute Brain Infections, by enabling knowledge sharing and collaboration that drives equity in who takes part and who benefits from health research.

The landscape of clinical trials has undergone significant changes and faces numerous challenges, such as fragmented governance, underrepresentation of key populations, and inefficient approval processes that limit their impact.

To address this, *The Lancet Global Health* has launched a new series to help align with ongoing efforts to strengthen clinical trials worldwide, with six articles that explore key reforms needed to strengthen clinical trial design, ethics, regulation, and infrastructure.
